Ad-Hoc Committee on High **Performance Training Centres**

Overview

1. These Terms of Reference describe the purpose, scope and authority of Volleyball Canada's Ad Hoc Committee on High Performance Training Centres. These Terms of Reference outline clear and specific information on how the Ad-Hoc Committee is organized, what it is trying to achieve, its decision-making authority and deliverables, who the members are, and when they meet.

Authority and Mandate

- 2. The Ad Hoc Committee on High Performance Training Centres will assist the Board of Directors understand the benefits of leasing and owning its national team training centres and how Volleyball Canada can create the optimal highperformance training environment.
- 3. The Committee serves in an advisory capacity to the Board and/or operations staff.
- 4. Members of the Committee will act honestly and in good faith.

Membership

- 5. The committee shall be composed of a minimum of five members, including a Chairperson.
- 6. The Chair of the Board shall appoint the Chairperson of the Ad-Hoc Committee.
- 7. The Chairperson shall appoint the other committee members in consultation with the Chair of the Board.
- 8. The Chairperson will be appointed for a two-year term, or as required in fulfilling the ad-hoc committees mandate. Other Committee members will be appointed for a term of one year, unless otherwise decided by the Chairperson.
- 9. The Board may replace the Chairperson of the Committee at any time. The Chairperson may remove any member of the Committee at any time and fill any vacancy at their discretion.
- 10. The Chair of the Board shall be an ex-officio and non-voting member of the committee.
- 11. The Chief Executive Officer shall be an ex-officio and non-voting member of the committee.

Conflict of Interest

- 12. Any member with a potential conflict of interest shall declare such conflict when they are appointed to the Committee and at the start of any meeting at which they may be conflicted on a topic for discussion. An individual will recuse themselves from any discussion when they are in conflict.
- 13. Conflict of Interest will remain a standing item on the agenda for all committee meetings.

Duties and Responsibilities

- 14. The Committee will:
 - a. Review and adhere to the Terms of Reference;
 - b. Review, evaluate and advise the Board on strengths/weaknesses for training centre models for national indoor, beach, and sitting programs;
 - c. Review and advise the Board on which option(s) would create the optimal high-performance training environment for indoor, beach and sitting national programs;
 - d. Suggest updates to these Terms of Reference to the Board.

Procedures

- 15. The Committee shall keep minutes of the discussion that will be included with its findings and recommendations.
- 16. The Committee shall meet as necessary at the discretion of the Chairperson via conference call/web conference or inperson.
- 17. The Chairperson is required to call a meeting of the committee if requested to do so by:
 - a. Any committee member
 - b. The Chair of the Board of Directors
 - c. The Chief Executive Officer
- 18. The Chairperson shall distribute the agenda to committee members at least 24 hours in advance of a scheduled meeting. The agenda shall include the following items:
 - a. Approval of the agenda
 - b. Approval of the minutes from the previous meeting
 - c. Declaration of Conflict of Interest
 - d. Ongoing business
- 19. Quorum will be a majority of the committee members.

Reporting

- 20. The committee will submit regular reports to the Board.
- 21. When the Board requires the Committee to make a decision or take a position on a matter, the Committee will make its decision or determine its position by majority vote of the Committee's members.
- 22. The committee will record minutes of all meetings. All minutes will be forwarded to the Chair and Chief Executive Officer.

Review

23. The Board of Directors shall review the Terms of Reference annually.

Ad-Hoc Committee on Strategic Planning

Overview

1. These Terms of Reference describe the purpose, scope and authority of Volleyball Canada's Ad Hoc Committee on Strategic Planning. These Terms of Reference outline clear and specific information on how the Ad-Hoc Committee is organized, what it is trying to achieve, its decision-making authority and deliverables, who the members are, and when they meet.

Authority and Mandate

- 2. The Ad Hoc Committee on Strategic Planning will assist the Board of Directors in fulfilling its responsibilities relating to consulting on Volleyball Canada's strategic planning.
- 3. The Committee serves in an advisory capacity to the Board and/or operations staff.
- 4. Members of the Committee will act honestly and in good faith.

Membership

- 5. The committee shall be composed of five members, including a Chairperson. The ad-hoc committee will have representation from Volleyball Canada's Board of Directors, and the Active Members.
- 6. The Chair of the Board shall appoint the Chairperson of the Ad-Hoc Committee.
- 7. The Chairperson shall appoint the other committee members in consultation with the Chair of the Board.
- 8. The Chairperson will be appointed for a two-year term, or as required in fulfilling the ad-hoc committees mandate. Other Committee members will be appointed for a term of one year, unless otherwise decided by the Chairperson.
- 9. The Board may replace the Chairperson of the Committee at any time. The Chairperson may remove any member of the Committee at any time and fill any vacancy at their discretion.
- 10. The Chair of the Board shall be an ex-officio and non-voting member of the committee.
- 11. The Chief Executive Officer shall be an ex-officio and non-voting member of the committee.

Conflict of Interest

- 12. Any member with a potential conflict of interest shall declare such conflict when they are appointed to the Committee and at the start of any meeting at which they may be conflicted on a topic for discussion. An individual will recuse themselves from any discussion when they are in conflict.
- 13. Conflict of Interest will remain a standing item on the agenda for all committee meetings.

Duties and Responsibilities

- 14. The Committee will:
 - a. Review and adhere to the Terms of Reference;
 - b. Develop and implement a process to receive feedback on Volleyball Canada's Strategic Plan from key stakeholders;
 - c. Advise the Board on the feedback received from stakeholders;
 - d. Recommend to the Board any changes to the Strategic Plan that should be considered;
 - e. Suggest updates to these Terms of Reference to the Board

Procedures

- 15. The Ad-Hoc Committee shall keep minutes of the discussion that will be included with its findings and recommendations.
- 16. The Committee shall meet as necessary at the discretion of the Chairperson via conference call/web conference or inperson.

Alumni and Awards Committee

Overview

1. These Terms of Reference describe the authority, mandate and responsibilities of Volleyball Canada's Alumni and Awards Committee. These Terms of Reference outline clear and specific information on how the Committee is organized, what it is trying to achieve, its decision-making authority and deliverables, who the members are, and when they meet.

Authority and Mandate

- 2. The Alumni and Awards Committee is an operations committee of Volleyball Canada.
- 3. The Committee is to provide leadership and direction to help enhance Volleyball Canada's alumni relations and oversee the awards and recognition programs.
- 4. The Committee serves in an advisory capacity to the Board and/or operations staff.
- 5. The Committee will make recommendations for input from the membership and approval of the Board of Directors as necessary.
- 6. The Committee may form sub-committees whenever necessary to facilitate the Committee's work.
- 7. Members of the Committee will act honestly and in good faith.

Membership

- 8. The Committee shall be composed of at least three (3) and not more than five (5) members, including a Chairperson.
- 9. The Chair of the Board shall appoint the chair of the committee who shall be an alumnus of Volleyball Canada.
- 10. Alumnus shall be broadly defined to include Volleyball Canada retired athletes and coaches (including Olympians, Paralympians, and Hall of Famers); former board members, support staff and builders of volleyball in Canada.
- 11. The Chair of the Committee will appoint the rest of the committee. Members will be deemed to have a solid understanding of Volleyball Canada's awards process.
- 12. The Committee shall have a Vice-Chair who shall be a Volleyball Canada staff. The Vice-Chair shall be a non-voting member of the committee.
- 13. The Board may replace the Chairperson of the Committee at any time. The Chairperson may remove any member of the Committee at any time and fill any vacancy at their discretion, with input from and in consultation with the Vice-Chair.
- 14. The Chairperson shall solicit nominations from Volleyball Canada's Active Members as necessary.
- 15. Committee members will be appointed for a term of one year, unless otherwise decided by the Chairperson.
- 16. The Chief Executive Officer shall be an ex-officio and non-voting member of the committee.
- 17. Volleyball Canada's Director, Communications shall be an ex-officio and non-voting member of the committee.

Conflict of Interest

- 18. Any member with a potential conflict of interest shall declare such conflict when they are appointed to the Committee and at the start of any meeting at which they may be conflicted on a topic for discussion. An individual will recuse themselves from any discussion when they are in conflict.
- 19. Conflict of Interest will remain a standing item on the agenda for all committee meetings.

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

20. Volleyball Canada is committed to encouraging diversity, inclusion, equity and access in its administration, policies, programs, and activities. Per its Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Policy, Volleyball Canada will work to provide Under-Represented Groups with an equitable range of opportunities to participate on this committee.

Duties and Responsibilities

- 21. The Committee will:
 - a. Review and adhere to the Terms of Reference:
 - b. Oversee the awards and recognition program, which has its primary objective to celebrate those individuals and teams who have made a significant contribution to Volleyball in Canada (categories include athlete, builder, coach, referee and team), including establishing the criteria and timelines for awards and recognition.
 - c. Select award recipients each year, in accordance with the criteria and timelines
 - d. Actively promote membership in and support Volleyball Canada, including promoting financial contributions from individuals, groups and/or corporations.
 - e. Support alumni activities and events, and leverage alumni talents and resources to benefit Volleyball Canada.
 - f. Serve as an ambassador for Volleyball Canada through interactions with players, coaches, staff, volunteers, partners, and donors at all levels.
 - g. Support, promote, and attend Volleyball Canada events and functions.
 - h. Perform additional tasks as may be assigned to the Committee by the Board of Directors, and/or by the Chief Executive Officer.

Procedures

- 22. The Committee shall keep minutes of the discussion that will be included with its findings and recommendations.
- 23. The Committee shall meet as necessary at the discretion of the Chairperson via conference call/web conference or inperson.
- 24. The Chairperson is required to call a meeting of the committee if requested to do so by:
 - a. Any committee member
 - b. The Chair of the Board of Directors
 - c. The Chief Executive Officer
- 25. The Chairperson, or designate, shall distribute the agenda to committee members at least 24 hours in advance of a scheduled meeting. The agenda shall include the following items:
 - a. Approval of the agenda
 - b. Approval of the minutes from the previous meeting
 - c. Declaration of Conflict of Interest
 - d. Ongoing business
- 26. Quorum will be a majority of the committee members.

Resources

27. The Committee shall have access to resources (annual, quadrennial, etc...) from Volleyball Canada to fulfill its duties as approved by the Chief Executive Officer.

Reporting

- 28. The Committee will submit regular reports to the Board through the President and Chief Executive Officer.
- 29. The Committee will report annually to the active members through Volleyball Canada's Annual Report.
- 30. The Chairperson shall be invited to Volleyball Canada's Annual General Meeting to report to the active members. A designate may be selected as necessary.
- 31. When the Board requires the Committee to make a decision or take a position on a matter, the Committee will make its decision or determine its position by majority vote of the Committee's members.

Review

32. The Board of Directors shall review the Terms of Reference at minimum every four years.

Approval

33. These Terms of Reference were approved by the Board of Directors on April 28, 2021.

Athlete and Coach Pathway **Committee**

Overview

1. These Terms of Reference describe the authority, mandate and responsibilities of Volleyball Canada's Athlete and Coach Pathway Committee. These Terms of Reference outline clear and specific information on how the Committee is organized, what it is trying to achieve, its decision-making authority and deliverables, who the mem-bers are, and when they meet.

Authority and Mandate

- 2. The Athlete and Coach Pathway Committee is an operations committee of Volleyball Canada.
- 3. The Committee is to provide leadership for the development of indoor, beach, and sitting vol-leyball in Canada, in accordance with the principles of Volleyball Canada's Long-Term Athlete Development (LTAD) model.
- 4. The Committee serves in an advisory capacity to the Board and/or operations staff.
- 5. The Committee will seek input from Volleyball Canada's Active Members.
- 6. The Committee may form sub-committees whenever necessary to facilitate the Committee's work
- 7. Members of the Committee will act honestly and in good faith.

Membership

- 8. The Committee shall be composed of at least five (5) and not more than nine (9) members, including a Chairperson.
- 9. The Chair of the Board shall appoint the Chairperson of the Committee. The Chairperson will be appointed for a two-year term.
- 10. The Board may replace the Chairperson of the Committee at any time. The Chairperson may remove any member of the Committee at any time and fill any vacancy at their discretion.
- 11. The Chairperson shall appoint the other committee members. Members are required to demonstrate an expertise in youth development in indoor, beach, and/or sitting volleyball. The Chairperson shall solicit nominations from Volleyball Canada's Active Members.
- 12. Volleyball Canada's Director of Athlete and Coach Pathways shall be considered the Vice-Chair of the Committee.
- 13. Other members of the Committee will include:
 - a. High Performance Director Indoor
 - b. High Performance Director Beach
 - c. Director, Sport Science and Innovation
 - d. PTA Representative
 - e. Other members with expertise as deemed required by the Chair of the Committee
- 14. Committee members will be appointed for a term of one year, unless otherwise decided by the Chairperson. Non-staff committee members shall serve no more than 6 consecutive terms.
- 15. The Chief Executive Officer shall be an ex-officio and non-voting member of the committee.

Conflict of Interest

- 16. Any member with a potential conflict of interest shall declare such conflict when they are ap-pointed to the Committee and at the start of any meeting at which they may be conflicted on a topic for discussion. An individual will recuse themselves from any discussion when they are in conflict.
- 17. Conflict of Interest will remain a standing item on the agenda for all committee meetings.

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

18. Volleyball Canada is committed to encouraging diversity, inclusion, equity and access in its administration, policies, programs, and activities. Per its Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Poli-cy, Volleyball Canada will work to provide Under-Represented Groups with an equitable range of opportunities to participate on this committee.

Duties and Responsibilities

- 19. The Committee will:
 - a. Review and adhere to the Terms of Reference;

Athletes' Council

- 8. Council members will be appointed for a term of two (2) years.
- 9. The Chair of the Board shall be an ex-officio and non-voting member of the Council.

Sitting Volleyball Committee

Name

Sitting Volleyball Committee

Mandate

The Sitting Volleyball Committee is a program committee of Volleyball Canada. Its role is to oversee the delivery of high performance programs for volleyball players with a disability.

Key Duties

The Committee will perform the following key duties:

- Oversee all aspects of the men's and women's National Team programs, including training and competition schedules, Training Centre facilities and IST support.
- Provide training, technical resources and development opportunities for coaches in disabled volleyball.
- Prepare and monitor budgets for the administration of National Team programs, and seek alternative funding sources to enhance opportunities.
- Raise awareness of the opportunities available for volleyball players with a disability, in both the volleyball and disabled communities.
- Offer expertise and resources to support the development of grass-roots programs in disabled volleyball.
- Serve as the Volleyball Canada liaison to various international and national organizations, including WOVD (World Organization for Volleyball for the Disabled), IPC (International Paralympic Committee), CPC (Canadian Paralympic Committee) and CASA (Canadian Amputee Sports Association).
- Perform such additional tasks as may be assigned to the Committee by the Board or by the President & Chief Executive Officer.

Authority

The Committee will make recommendations for input from the membership and approval of the Board of Directors

The committee can form sub-committees whenever necessary to facilitate the committee's work.

The committee's plans (annual, quadrennial, etc.) and the annual budget must be approved by the President & Chief Executive Officer.

Composition

The composition of the Committee will include:

- A Chair
- All Head Coaches
- A representative who will fulfill the national and international liaison function of the Committee
- A representative who will fulfill the grass roots development function of the Committee
- Disabled Volleyball Head Coach/Coordinator (staff)
- The President & Chief Executive Officer is ex-officio member of the committee
- Other members with expertise deemed required by the Chair and/or Board of Directors

Appointment

With the exception of staff, the Board of Directors shall appoint the chairperson and the chairperson shall nominate all other committee members to be approved by the Board

Members of the Committee will serve terms of one year, and such terms may be renewed to a maximum of six consecutive terms.

Nominations from the community, including P/T Associations should be solicited.

When approving the committee membership, the Board will consider the ability and experience of the candidate as well as the diverse nature of Volleyball Canada's membership, including language, gender and geographic location as weighting for approval.

Meetings

The Committee will meet by telephone or in person, as required. Meetings will be at the call of the Chair or at the call of the President & Chief Executive Officer.

Resources

The Committee will receive the necessary resources from Volleyball Canada to fulfill its mandate. The President & Chief Executive Officer has final authority on all staffing.

Name

National Referee Committee

Mandate

The National Referee Committee is a program committee of Volleyball Canada. Its role is to provide leadership and direction to Volleyball Canada's Referee programs.

Key Duties

The Committee will perform the following key duties:

- To promote the development of the National Certification program in order to ensure a high level of officiating in Canada.
- To promote the development of the International Referees program to ensure that Canadian Referees are represented at FIVB and other competitions.
- To assist the regions to educate, train, and certify Referee at the local, provincial and regional levels.
- To work with the regions (or other volleyball stakeholders), to assist in the development and recruitment of referees.
- To work with the regions (or other volleyball partners) in delivering the Referee Development Plan to the volleyball community.

Beach High Performance

High Performance Beach Committee

Beach High Performance Director's Report

The Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games (July 23-August 6, 2021) was a substantial step in the evolution of Volleyball Canada's Beach National Team Program – a few points separated two quarter-final defeats from an all-Canadian Olympic semi-final. Canada was the only country to place two women's beach teams in the Tokyo 2020 Olympic quarterfinals.

Since 2011 when Volleyball Canada established a centralized Beach National Team training program at the Beach High Performance Centre at Downsview Park, Toronto), the performances of Volleyball Canada's Beach National Teams have grown exponentially:

- 0 teams in the Beijing 2008 Olympic Games

 8 Olympic teams in London, Rio, and Tokyo
- 0 top 5 results @ FIVB Senior World Championships (WCH) since 1999 6 Top 5 results @ FIVB Senior WCH since 2013 (including a gold medal in 2019)
- 0 FIVB World Tour Medals (2003-2011) \longrightarrow 45 FIVB World Tour medals since 2015 (4 in 2021)

Despite being just short in Tokyo, looking at the entire Olympic Cycle (2017-2021) highlights key successes:

- Both Canadian Women's senior teams were ranked #1 in the FIVB World Ranking
 - Heather Bansley/Brande Wilkerson in 2018
 - Sarah Pavan/Melissa Humana-Paredes in 2019
- Sarah Pavan/Melissa Humana-Paredes were the 2019 FIVB World Champions

The success of the Canadian Beach National Teams, especially the women's teams, has resulted in Own the Podium (OTP) funding for the VC Beach National Team to increase from \$150,000 in 2016-17 to \$850,000 in 2022-2023 (7 consecutive years of increases in OTP funding). This increase in funding has resulted in the VC Beach National Team support staff to grow from 3 full-time staff and 2 part-time staff in 2011 to 11 full-time and 9 part-time staff in 2022 (a list of these 20 VC Beach High Performance Program staff is listed at the end of this report).

Learnings from experiences related to Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games as well as a review of our Next Gen program has led the VC Beach High Performance (HP) Program to place greater resources to support the mental health, wellness, and performance of Volleyball Canada's Beach National Team athletes as this support not only enables them to train and compete to their fullest potential, but also supports their evolution and development as positive ambassadors for Canadian sport. In 2022, Bryce Tully was added as the Manager of Culture Development and Mental Performance Services along with Iman Hassan the Next Gen Mental Performance Consultant and Susan Cockle the Mental Health Lead.

An area that has become apparent over the previous 5 years is the need to improve the Coaching & Technical Leadership (CTL) within the VC Beach High Performance Program. As a result, Volleyball Canada has added five CTL experts in 2022 including two full-time Senior Coaches (Srdjan Veckov and Ricardo De Freitas), one part-time men's Mentor Coach (Adam Schulz), one full-time Next Gen Assistant Coach for both women and men (Heather Bansley - who officially retired as an athlete in February 2022) and one full-time Data Scientist (Emily Wright) to our Daily Training Environment.

Srdjan Veckov (Team Coach Melissa Humana-Paredes/Sarah Pavan), Ricardo de Freitas (Team Coach Brandie Wilkerson/ Sophie Bukovec) and Adam Schulz (Team Coach Sam Schachter/Dan Dearing) will mentor our NextGen Coaches (Josh Nichol, Adriana Bento and Heather Bansley) when their respective teams are training in Toronto and not competing internationally. It is expected these coaches will be in Toronto for up to 5 months per year.

To help reinforce and support the Podium Pathway, the Summer Development Program (SDP) has increased the ability to integrate and onboard athletes playing from September to May in NCAA Beach Volleyball programs, Indoor university/ college teams, and indoor pro teams. From May 13-15, 2022, 73 athletes (39 male and 34 female athletes) registered for the 2022 SDP Selection Camp (28 were selected - 14 in each gender). The newly formed partnership between VC's Beach HP Program and RBC Training Ground has led to some of these previously unknown athletes registering for SDP Selection Camp and those ultimately selected will receive additional financial support from RBC. This robust pathway will support athletes preparing to compete for medals in Los Angeles 2028 and Brisbane 2032.

Looking ahead to Paris (2024), Los Angeles (2028) and Brisbane (2032) Olympic Games, the coming 3 years will focus on supporting 2 Women's teams to compete for medals in Paris, working to qualify a Men's team for the Paris 2024 Olympics and dramatically enhancing the coaching and technical leadership in the DTE and throughout the athlete and coach development pathways.

With regards to the VC Beach High Performance Centre (BHPC), Volleyball Canada signed a lease extension with Downsview Park until May 31, 2025. Since mid-March 2022, the VC BHPC has been renting the three beach courts at full capacity (7 days per week - 6:30PM-11:00PM weekdays and 9AM-11PM weekends). A Beach Spring Break Camp (Athletes aged 12U to 15U years old) was successfully organized at the Downsview BHPC March 14-18, 2022. Twenty-four (24) athletes participated in this camp (Maximum capacity). VC plans to offer similar 1-week camps during July and August in 2022 as a pilot project.



Athlete and Coach Pathways

The Athlete and Coach Pathways Committee is responsible for providing recommendations to the Board of Directors based on the principles of Volleyball Canada's Long Term Development (LTD) Model for the promotion and growth of volleyball at the domestic level. The decisions are based on consistent communication with our provincial and territory partners as well as research through pilot projects and data collection. For the time period between April 1, 2021 and March 31, 2022, Athlete and Coach Pathways included the following program areas and initiatives:

Coach Eligibility

- Significant developments in the National Championship Coach Eligibility were undertaken in 2021-2022. With the return to play, a significant number of new coaches entered the pathway. Eligibility included 5 mandatory components:
 - Making Head Way
 - Making Ethical Decisions Evaluation
 - Safe Sport Training
 - Foundations of Volleyball
 - Criminal Record Check and Screening
- This process was time consuming when in March it was noted that over 30% of head coaches did not meet eligibility.
- By May of 2022, all head coaches met eligibility to participate at national championships.

Areas of Improvement Required:

- Coaches completing their certification gap on evaluations
- · Early season intervention and communication with coaches/club to ensure requirements are being completed
- Transitioning Development Coach to Advanced Development Coach
- Difficult communication to achieve certification and the coach pathway
- Increased checks in place to ensure requirements are being met

Moving Forward:

• Volleyball Canada Registration System integration with coach requirements

Athlete Pathways

Alignment

- Further alignment and development of the Pathways strategic plan for coaching, youth development, specific to LTD, and athlete competitions
- Athlete competitions and enhancements to ensure continued athlete development and alignment between National Championships, Canada Cup, and Canada Games

Pathway Programs

National Excellence Program (NEP) 2021-2022

- Top 18 athletes were invited and all accepted into program.
- 170 applications through GMTM
- Athletes represent 6 provinces, and 13 different club programs.
- Program ran successfully from Sept through to December 2021
- Competition included various USport and CCAA teams
- 12 athletes selected to Team Canada Roster for U18 World Championships in Sept.
- Feedback from athletes, homestay families, and educational support was very positive.

Regional Excellence Program (REP)

The REP program was limited in 2021-2022 due to COVID uncertainty.

In BC, Burnaby and North Vancouver School District programs were able to be offered with the school learning group model and programs continued to see excellent numbers. Regina, Kootenay and Kelowna did see an increase in registration due to lack of high school athletic programs. The REP program continues to contribute to LTD and provide additional resources to the athlete pathways department

National Team Programs 2021 Overview

U19 Men

- 30 athletes selected
- Coaching Staff: Mike Hawkins, Matt Krueger, Brock Davidiuk, Dave Preston, Nathan Groenveld, and Jared Brown
- Training included 2 ½ weeks, competition not available due to Covid

U18 Women

- 12 athletes represented Canada at the U18 World Championships in Durango, Mexico
- Athletes were selected from the NEP 2021 cohort group.
- Finishing 16th, the competition was the first high performance competition for the selected athletes in 18 months.

Grassroots Development

Throughout 2021-2022, the importance of grassroots volleyball in the return to sport has been a focus for pathway development.

The Smashball App continued to be a critical resource for program development at the 8-12 year cohort. The application provides teachers, community coaches and clubs with a clean, easy to use resource for drills, game overviews, and adaptations. The Elearning module for Elementary based programs is continuing to be a valuable resource for teachers and any coach working with new participants.

The Grassroots Working Group has been established and continued to be active in the review of current resources, marketing opportunities and advancement of new markets.

Critical to the development of the grassroots, Volleyball Canada developed the Community Coach Workshop, completed in March 2022. Pilot workshops will be released in June 2022. The workshop is approx. 3 hours virtual with a focus on the Smashball app as a resource for youth development. It is anticipated that any coach working with youth in a community centre and club would benefit from the workshop.

Long Term Development

The release of the LTD 3.0 is scheduled for September 2022. The LTD was completed, including translation and will continue to drive forward the new athlete development matrix, including the Person Pillar.

Club Approval Program

Club approval process was released in 2021-2022 to ensure every club participating in Volleyball Canada programming has approved by their PTA within Volleyball Canada established standards. Starting in September 2021, every club completed the process to participate, while ensuring the guiding principles of quality safe sport practices.

Club approval will continue to evolve as safe quality sport moves from educational to mandatory.

Athlete and Coach Pathways Committee Outcomes

2021-2022 Outcomes of the Athlete and Coach Pathways Committee were as follows:

- Coach Eligibility for National Championships
- Long Term Development and Athlete Matrix completion
- Coach Education Pathways including Community Coach, Learning Management System review, and Performance Coach and Advanced Development Coach blending learning models.
- Review and approval of National Championships Policy, including age eligibility
- Data-mining initiatives to determine areas of focus Gender Equity and Coach Certification

Alumni and Awards

Each year, Volleyball Canada conducts an induction into the Volleyball Canada (VC) Hall of Fame under the categories— Athlete, Builder, Coach, Referee or Team. These awards have been established to recognize those individuals or teams who have attained prominence in the sport of volleyball or who have made a major contribution to the development and advancement of the sport in Canada or Internationally.

This past year we held an online induction ceremony to induct 4 distinguished members of our sport into the Volleyball Canada Hall of Fame. It was a program put together by the Volleyball Canada staff and they were able to create a very memorable opportunity for the inductees.

We have invited the 4 inductees from last year to attend this year's induction. The class of 2020, inducted in 2021 to celebrate this vear:

John Barrett — ATHLETE Kathy Tough — ATHLETE Theresa Maxwell — BUILDER Brad Barton — REFEREE

They will have an opportunity to celebrate their induction along with this year's inductees. Our 2022 inductees are: Kristine Drakich — COACH and Michel Paiement — BUILDER.

Facebook continues to be our main source of communication with former Volleyball Canada athletes. The Facebook page currently has 250 Alumni signed up and actively contributing to the page.

Going forward we will continue to engage more VC Alumni. Having a presence and visibility at major events such as Volleyball Nations League, the VC Championships and on the Volleyball Canada Website will enable us to continue to grow and reach former athletes.

This coming year, the Committee will continue to compile a virtual history of para, beach and indoor Canadian Volleyball, as well as a history of Team Canada at major events. We are looking to gather photos and write ups that can be included in the project.

Domestic Competitions

2022 Indoor Senior National Championships

This new pilot event will be held May 14-15 at the Edmonton Expo Centre. Initially, the event was planned to host 6 divisions

- Senior Open Men
- Senior Open Women
- Masters 40+ Men
- Masters 40+ Women
- Masters 50+ Men
- Masters 50+ Women

The Masters divisions were cancelled in early April due to low registrations. The cost of the Senior Open was reduced to entice teams to register, the event will be run with 6 men's teams and 5 women's teams. Teams will come from ON, AB, and BC for both divisions.

The event was simplified to offer a reduced registration fee and to not suffer too much of a budgetary loss.

Two major issues noted in regards to low registrations:

- · Lack of knowledge of the event
- Too close to youth nationals

2022 Indoor Youth National Championships

Youth Nationals will be held in May 2022 as per the following:

- May 5 8: Ottawa 14U
- May 12 15: Richmond 14UG, Burnaby 14UB, Halifax 14U
- May 18 21: Edmonton 15U & 17U
- May 22 24: Edmonton 16U & 18U

Participation for 2022 will come in at approximately 1031 teams, the largest yet for indoor youth nationals. 14U and 15U have lower than normal registration numbers while 18U has significantly larger than normal numbers.

2022 Beach National Championships

The Volleyball Canada Beach National Championships will be hosted in two cities in 2022 from August 18th to August 28th.

- August 18-21: Ashbridges Bay, Toronto, ON (14U-19U Boys/Girls & Senior)
- August 25-28: Spanish Banks East, Vancouver, BC (14U-16U Boys/Girls)

Participation: With the addition of Vancouver, we are projecting upwards of 400 youth and senior teams between the two events.

Program Improvements

During the 2021-2022 season, the VC events staff have been working on several program improvements for the 2022 event.

- Senior Points System Restructure
- New Youth Beach Coaching Requirements
- Expansion of Age-Categories (introduction of 15U Boys, 17U and 19U Boys/Girls categories)
- Expansion of on-site promotions and activations (VC Booth, "try" beach sessions, para-demos)

- Enhancing Senior Feature Court experience (athlete bios and intros, interviews)
- Legacy Programming Supporting Local Underrepresented Youth
- Adult Rec Tournament

University/College Beach National Championships

The inaugural University/College Beach Championships will be hosted at Ashbridges Bay in Toronto, Ontario this September 3-4.

The two-day event is open to teams from Canadian post-secondary institutions and will feature both a men's and women's event. Initial public response has been strong, and we are hopeful that it could translate to a full draw for each gender.

Registration for the championship will open alongside Senior and Youth Beach Nationals on June 14th.

VC Combine

The VC Combine was launched in the fall of 2021 with an event held in Vaughan Ontario. In January 2022, a 2nd event was held in Edmonton, AB. Additional events were cancelled due to COVID-19, lack of trained staff to run the event, and lack of access to facilities.

VC will work with the women's and men's NEP programs for the 2022 – 2023 season to host events together whenever possible. This will ensure that all NEP participants have their data tracked and then additional members of the public will also be able to attend.

National Referee

The 2021-22 season has been a year showcasing the optimism and resolve of the volleyball community as return to sport plans were developed, implemented, adjusted, and ultimately realized (in some capacity). This was no different for the referees as we returned to competition in a fashion that was not consistent across the country.

Regardless of how the return to sport plan came to pass, there was an optimism and excitement amongst the refereeing community that they could return to courts and provide a service to the participants.

Domestic Development

Traditionally, the focus of grassroots domestic development programming has been captured by the technical capacity to interpret and apply the Rules of the Game in live competition. Through a staggered introduction of competitive environments, the referee is gradually challenged to adjust, adapt, and grow their skill sets to the point of being able to manage matches at all levels of youth competition.

While this approach is successful in developing a foundation for on court performance, it is one-dimensional and limiting in the overall development of referees. Considering the impact of the pandemic, a concerted effort was made to broaden the structure of referee programming and expand from the linear nature of current programs.


Specific programming areas that have shown growth and success include:

- Incorporation of Safe Sport requirements throughout the developmental pathway
- Enhancement of programming by incorporation of gender equity, diversity, and inclusion components
- Establishing basic developmental frameworks for new disciplines (para, snow, grass...)
- Establishing developmental congruency between all disciplines
- Establishing a transparent rubric for each stage of the developmental pathway
- Framework establishment for annual renewal testing requirements
- Modernization of programming by incorporating technologies

While comprehensive growth of programming is an end goal that will tie-in significantly with long-term referee development initiatives, the effects of the pandemic were realized with respect to retention. During the pandemic, referee retention was nothing more than a forecasted value. With the success of return to sport initiatives, the true impact became measurable with the capturing of registration data.

By comparison, the retention of referees varied widely by province/territory (30% < x > 80%), but on an overall scale it is roughly 60% (2426 v 1475) that of pre-pandemic values.

Referee Registrations Pre- / Post- Pandemic



Considering the pyramidical nature of the referee population, the greatest impacts were observed in the grassroots stages, where smaller changes occurred in the high-performance ranks.

With respect to the impact of the pandemic on beach refereeing, that assessment will not be measurable until the conclusion of our 2022 beach season.


As the overall demand for volleyball appears not to have decreased coming out of the pandemic, establishing strong recruitment and retention strategies will be paramount over the next several seasons to recreate a strong foundation of referees across the country.

High-Performance and International Referee Development

In trying to bridge the gap between the upper ends of our domestic programming and International Referee development, the National Referee Committee worked through the pandemic to create a transparent pathway that will focus on the identification and classification of high-performing level 4 referees.

In principle, the purpose of classification is to identify (with support of the PTAs) referees that have the capacity and skill set to whistle at the highest levels in Canada. It should be stressed that this is not a developmental program with entry by application.

At the outset, high-performing level 4 referees will be classified into one of four categories based on proficiency (level C, B2, B1 and A). Each category carries annual requirements and a dedicated timeframe for movement to the next stage. Referees that achieve the highest level of classification may be nominated for attendance at a NORCECA International Referee Course, while referees that fail to meet the annual standards or timeframes for advancement will be moved out of the pathway.



With respect to our international referees, despite ongoing changes to the developmental process at the FIVB and Confederation levels:

- Six of eleven indoor referees are recognized with an FIVB referee categorization
 - We received four nominations to the upcoming '22 Volleyball Nations League
- The other five have officially completed their Continental referee categorization requirements through NORCECA
- All five have nominations to various NORCECA based competitions
- Two of seven beach referees are recognized with an FIVB referee categorization
- Three of the remaining five have completed their Continental referee categorization requirements with the other two waiting for match opportunities at which to be assessed
- Two of the six have been nominated for promotion to an FIVB categorized referee and are awaiting course opportunities
- Of our two international Para Volley referees, it is anticipated that they will receive nominations to the upcoming World Championships

Long-Term Referee Development

In striving to develop a true long-term referee development program that will support sustained recruitment and retention in a safe and equitable fashion, the following objectives were the primary areas of focus over the course of the pandemic:

- Updating and aligning referee policies and procedures
- Establishing a diversified communication strategy that serves all referees within Canada
- Development of a standardized referee mentorship program
- Modernization of programming through increased and effective usage of technology
- Establishing metrics of sustainability for all programming
- Enhancing the recognition of referee successes at both Volleyball Canada and the PTA level

As we continue to grow and enhance the long-term development program, the Referee Committee recognizes the importance that technology can and will play in the future delivery of all programming. To that end we are excited to be working with the other pathway pillars in establishing a Learning Management System.

Implementation of a learning management system is a long overdue component in the modernization and delivery of referee programming. The capabilities associated with the administration, tracking and reporting of analytical data will greatly assist in the identification of future training and learning gaps within the refereeing community. Not only for those that are seeking to progress through the certification pathways, but also for the establishment and implementation of a Lifelong Learning Program.

National Referee Committee

As we move into the 2022 - 23 season, the National Referee Committee will be experiencing turnover of members that have officially reached the limitations of their terms. The Committee recognizes the extensive commitment of time and effort these members have given towards improving refereeing in Canada.

Each of these members have expressed a desire to stay engaged as a resource for those that are incoming to these roles. We look forward to the fresh perspectives the incoming members will bring to the Referee Committee and towards the shaping of refereeing in Canada into the future.

Safe Sport and Gender Equity/ **Diversity/Inclusion**

Volleyball Canada has full-time employee Julie Young and part-time employee Caroline Sharp working in the areas of Safe Sport and Gender Equity/Diversity/Inclusion. Following is a summary of initiatives that have been completed as well as key objectives moving forward:

Safe Sport

Safe Sport Complaints

Awareness of the VC Safe Sport Complaint process increased significantly over the past year with increased calls to VC's Independent third-party Safe Sport Officer from PTA's, clubs, athletes, and parents.

Some complaints fall under the Discipline and Complaints Policy (not Safe Sport) and get referred back to the PTA or Club. Resources are being developed to assist organizations with properly managing non-Safe Sport complaints.

VC is currently in the process of finalizing an agreement with SDRCC to manage all Complaints. Sport Canada is funding SDRCC's new safe sport program. The Office of the Sport Integrity Commissioner will operate independently to receive complaints about alleged violations of the Universal Code of Conduct to Address and Prevent Maltreatment in Sport (UCCMS). Where necessary, it will launch independent investigations and recommend sanctions against individuals who are found to have committed a violation. Lise Maclean will be stepping down as VC's third-party Independent Safe Sport Officer at the end of June.

Background Screening

VC's Screening Committee remains in place with members Boris Tyzuk, Dan McIntosh, Mark Eckert, and Caroline Sharp. The Committee reviews all issues that arise from criminal background and reference checks and acts as a resource for PTAs to review screening issues and provide recommendations.

Background screening is a requirement for all VC staff, volunteers, coaches, and persons in authority. It is also a requirement of the Club Approval Program. Background Screening has been implemented this season for all appropriate members as per the VC Screening Policy. VC and PTAs are working with Sterling Backcheck to complete the screening. Integration with the VRS has not been smooth however which has required manual reviews which has been a lengthy process with the return to competition. VC is verifying that all coaches have the necessary safe sport requirements in place for National Championships. PTA's have also been asked to provide attestations that the Safe Sport requirements are being met for its participants in National events.

Education

Safe Sport training requirements continued to be enforced and monitored for all VC staff and volunteers. Safe Sport training is also a requirement for all persons in authority. The plan was to have training and screening requirements tracked through the new VRS system this season. This has proven difficult however due to issues with the CAC's Locker. Some PTAs use Respect in Sport, and this is not reporting at 100% either. Manual verification has been needed and has been time consuming for all. We will continue to work towards finding solutions to automate these verifications moving forward and make the process smoother.

Safe Sport Information Sessions were staged virtually with every National Team Program (all disciplines, age classes and genders) and a take-away resource document was provided to all participants in the sessions. A Referee Safe Sport webinar was staged in 2021 with over 75 referees taking part.

Youth Safe Sport Education Tool

VC applied for funding through the COC's Return to Sport Fund to develop a Safe Sport education tool geared towards youth

and was approved! VC along with Athletics Canada and Swimming Canada are working together on this initiative. The working group has met weekly and have engaged Vantage Consulting to work with us on developing the tool, which we hope to launch next year. Vantage is working with us on internal and external research, requirements development, vendor assessment and vendor contract negotiations. The Education tool will be youth oriented and "gamified" to appeal to the 11 -18 age group and will feature different modules for key topics under maltreatment prevention, athlete well-being and Engagement (mental health, eating disorders etc.), Sport Science (nutrition, injury prevention etc.) and Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.

Risk Management

A VC Risk Matrix was drafted for the Board to review and update.

Safe Sport is a key element of the VC Club Approval Program which was launched as a pilot for the new season. Safe sport training and screening requirements are key components of the program. More work needs to be done to facilitate compliance and ensure monitoring.

New sections were added to the VC website under Safe Sport related to Injury prevention and mental health, including concussion protocols.

Gender Equity/Diversity/Inclusion

Education

All VC staff (including all coaches) and contract employees were required to complete training in Gender Equity through the Women and Sport Gender Equity Lens Module.

All VC Staff and contract employees were required to complete Indigenous training through Sport for Life's Canadian Indigenous Culture Training - Truth and Reconciliation Edition.

Program Development

Gender Equity

VC completed its work with the Women and Sport Playbook Program which examined gender equity in our sport and developed strategies and plans to address shortfall areas. These strategies are being implemented into the different program areas, with a focus on coach and referee development at the high performance levels.


Diversity & Inclusion

VC is working in partnership with Deloitte Inc. on the development of its Equity Diversity and Inclusion (DEI) Strategic Framework and Implementation Plan. Funding support for this partnership has been provided by the Canadian Olympic Committee through its NSO Return to Sport Program. Ensuring volleyball is accessible to everyone is one of the foundations of our commitment to our players, parents, coaches, officials, and partners and the focus on the first phase of this partnership is on data analysis and research to understand how the organization should build a more inclusive sport for all.

As a starting point on this journey, Deloitte is conducting a survey of members of the volleyball community with two key objectives:

- Gather a deep understanding of the demographics of the volleyball community across Canada.
- Understand the sentiments around equity and inclusion among stakeholders.

From this research, we hope to identify strategic DEI priorities that align with the most impactful critical moments and/or barriers across stakeholder participation. This data gathering and analysis phase will continue through to the fall of 2022 when work will commence on the strategic framework and plans moving forward.

International Relations

2021-2022 was a year of recovery from the coronavirus pandemic, which saw our international volleyball scene start to return to normal. We experienced an unusual Tokyo Olympics (July/Aug) and Paralympics (Aug/Sept.), having been postponed from 2020 placing enormous strain on our athletes and staff. International volleyball restarted in 2021 with both the beach volleyball tour and VNL.

At the Olympic Games, Canada was represented by two female beach teams, each advancing to the quarterfinals of the Olympic tournament. The men's indoor team also advanced to the guarter-final to be eliminated by Russia.

The women's Paralympic (sitting volleyball) team had its best-ever result at a Games, finishing fourth and gaining valuable international experience.

The VNL 2021 was held in a secure bubble in Rimini, Italy from 25 May to 25 June for the women's edition and 28 May to 27 June for the men's edition. 32 of the world's strongest national teams battle it out to be crowned VNL champions as the flagship volleyball competition.

The 16 teams of each gender competed in a round-robin format. The teams played three matches each week and competed five weeks long, for a total of 120 matches. The top four teams after the preliminary round compete in the final round. Due to the pandemic, no teams will be relegated from this event. This works considerably in the favor of Canada, allowing both our men and women the assurance of competing again in 2022.

All of VC's hosting obligations were cancelled since the Olympic Qualifier in Vancouver in early 2020including the 2021 Sr Men's NORCECA Championships in Gatineau, QC, in August. However, our planning efforts jumped considerably in the fall of 2021 and 2022 as we prepare to host 2 VNL events, and the Sr Men's Pan Am Cup in 2022.

NORCECA held a Sport Organizing Committee (SOC) over zoom in February 2022 and is currently rebounding to offer a full slate of competitions in 2022. Alan Ahac remains a member of the NORCECA SOC and Mark Eckert attends as a member of the Executive Committee.

Mark Eckert remains a member of the NORCECA Executive as Vice President of the Central Zone. NORCECA executive meetings were held virtually in October of 2021 and February of 2022

Mark Eckert remains a member of the FIVB Board of Administration and attended Board meetings in Lausanne in the fall of 2021 and March of 2022.

Mark also participated as a member of the VNL Council and Project Empowerment as well as Snow Volleyball Commission.

The FIVB Volleyball Empowerment project adopted Canada's Women's Team, and this results in annual funding up to 2024 of 200 thousand US

As noted last year, FIVB has undergone a significant change, spawning off Volleyball World as its commercial, marketing arm of the international federation. Volleyball World's mission is "to grow the sport by embracing all volleyball stakeholders with a shared purpose to become the largest connected sports ecosystem in the world." FIVB will continue to focus on governance and the administration of the sport, while Volleyball World will focus on the public-facing side of volleyball events and promotion. The commercial initiative is billed as being worth \$300 million US. The FIVB is working in partnership with CVC Capital Partners Fund VII, which has invested in and worked with numerous other sports including Formula 1, Moto GP and rugby union. VW has grown this year as VNL and the Beach Tour have initiated, and Canada's profile as an event host has grown at VW as they have asked us to run 2 VNL events in 2021. There also were considerable efforts to have us host Beach Tour events however this would extend our financial commitments too thin.

Mark Eckert's role in the FIVB continues to grow: Presently, Mark Eckert is the President of the Central zone with NORCECA, a member of the VNL Commission, Snow Volleyball Commission and Project Empowerment and the Board of Administration. Ed Drakich, Guy Bradbury and Andre Trottier are on FIVB rules of the game and beach commissions. Jackie Skender (VC director of communications) was named secretary of the NORCECA press commission.

Alan Ahac remains an FIVB Technical Supervisor and has been assigned to work at the U18 World Championships in September 2021.

Volleyball Canada will continue to gain leadership and roles of influence in both NORCECA and the FIVB as they adjust their business models and move forward over the coming years.

NORCECA & FIVB Beach Commission

Ed Drakich (CAN) was appointed President of the NORCECA Beach Commission in 2016 and the FIVB Beach Commission. Secretary in 2021.

A NORCECA Beach Commission Virtual Meeting was held on March 31, 2022, and the meeting notes are below:

NORCECA Beach Commission Virtual Meeting - March 31, 2022

- 1. Cristobal Marte welcomed the Beach Commission members to the meeting and stated that as many as 10 NORCECA Beach Tour events would be organized in 2022.
- 2. Ed Drakich welcomed the Beach Commission members to the meeting and indicated that he was enthusiastic the 2022 NORCECA Beach Tour.
- 3. Indhira Ramirez informed the Beach Commission of the two NORCECA FIVB World Championship Qualification events to be held April 15-18, 2021, in Santo Domingo, DOM and Punta Cana, DOM.
- 4. Indhira Ramirez explained that the NORCECA Beach Tour hosting conditions for 2022 would remain the same as previous years.
- 5. Ed Drakich explained that beginning in 2022 the NORCECA Beach Tour Events would consist of a Modified Pool Play System like the format used on the FIVB World Tour (and starting in 2022 the Volleyball World Challenge and Future events).
- 6. Ed Drakich proposed that the 2022 and 2023 NORCECA Beach Tour Finals should be organized as the last event of each season (in November or December) but that the 2024 NORCECA Beach Tour Finals would be organized in May 2024 so it could be counted toward the Paris 2024 Olympic Ranking system. This proposal was approved.
- 7. Ed Drakich explained the Qualification System for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games and proposed that NORCECA approve using only 1-team per National Federation (As opposed to 2-teams per National Federation as was the case for London, Rio, and Tokyo) in the NORCECA Continental Cup Paris 2024 Olympic Qualification System. The proposal was approved.
- 8. Ed Drakich indicated the Santiago 2023 Pan American Games would take place October 20-November 5, 2023.
- 9. Andre Trottier presented the NORCECA Beach Referee report.
- 10. Cristobal Marte indicated that he was grateful to the NORCECA Beach Commission members for their participation in this meeting. The meeting was adjourned.

FIVB Refereeing and Rules of the Game Commission and **NORCECA Refereeing Commission**

FIVB Refereeing and Rules of The Game Commission

The FIVB Refereeing and Rules of the Game Commission hosted a combined in-person/virtual meeting January 2022 with the focus on developing a strategic direction since this was the first in person since 2020. The Commission has 5 primary directions - referee categorization and statistics, referee education and training, rules and regulations/tests, beach volleyball and special projects and development.

Key Decisions:

- Career Extensions: Extend the mandatory international referee retirement age from 55 years to 60 years pending meeting FIVB technical and medical standards
- Rule Tests:
 - During the 2022 World Club Championships: test the elimination of double touch decisions on second contact internal pass.
 - During the 2023 World Age Group championships: eliminate overhand service reception
- Women in Refereeing Project: The FIVB is reviewing a project to support and enhance the development opportunities for girls and women as referees.

The FIVB President noted that the future for international referees (Beach and Volleyball) will be based upon performance. From a Canadian perspective Volleyball Canada has six FIVB Categorized Volleyball Referees - Matt Van Raalte (NB), Scott Dziewirz (QC), Andrew Cameron (ON), Andrew Robb (ON), Samara Sevor (ON) and Ryan Bunyan (AB). For Beach Volleyball three FIVB Categorized Referees Omid Mojtahedi (ON), Brian Hiebert (BC) and Lucie Guillemette (QC) as a Challenge Referee.

NORCECA Refereeing Commission

The NORCECA Referee Commission has developed a strategic direction based upon 5 core themes for both Beach Volleyball and Volleyball - improving zonal support particularly for the Caribbean and Central America, launching a program to support referee coaches, launching a program to support women and girls in refereeing, development of a referee sustainability initiative and creating a NORCECA specific referee data and management system.

Key Decisions:

- Adopt a strategic direction for the 2020-2024 quadrennial
- To adopt a NORCECA Referee Categorization Program
- To have a referee coach in each federation by 2024
- To host a NORCECA International Volleyball Referee Candidate Course in 2022
- To host a NORCECA International Beach Volleyball Referee Candidate Course in 2023

Canada is very well represented within NORCECA with 11 International Volleyball Referees and Candidates for Volleyball, Matt Van Raalte (NB), Serge Theriault (QC), Scott Dziewirz (QC), Marie-Claude Levesque (QC) – candidate, Andrew Cameron (ON), Andrew Robb (ON), Samara Sevor (ON), Jason Dodd (ON), Ryan Bunyan (AB), Sara Maxwell-Bunyan (AB) - candidate, Steve Hewitson (BC). There are eight International Volleyball Referees and Candidates, Geoff Stuart (NS) - candidate, Lucie Guillemette (QC) Simon Ouellet (QC), Marcia Quaguarelli (QC) - candidate, Omid Mojtahedi (ON), Dimitri Magirias (ON), Jasen Boyko (AB), and Brian Hiebert (AB).

NORCECA Sport Organizing Committee

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, all NORCECA events in 2021 were cancelled, however 2022 features a full slate of events. NORCECA convened an SOC zoom meeting on March 2 2022. Alan Ahac participated as an SOC Member while Mark Eckert attended as an Executive Committee member. Attached is the NORCECA event calendar for 2022.

While Canada is only hosting one NORCECA event in 2022 - the Senior Men's Pan Am Cup in Gatineau, QC in August - we also have 2 VNL events this summer. We have been able to take advantage of surplus Sport Canada hosting funds available from fiscal 2021-22 to supplement hosting grants for 2022 events.

Alan Ahac also attended the U18 World Championships in Sept 2021 in Durango, Mexico as a Technical Delegate.

Canada plans to attend all NORCECA events which they qualify for in 2022. Given the way rankings are now determined, all matches count towards country rankings. Thus it is important Canada attend all events it qualifies for. This undoubtedly creates a challenge on our resources that we are carefully managing.

Partnership Report

verview **2021-22**

The global pandemic turned the sporting world on its head, and despite the challenging times, the Tokyo and Beijing Olympic and Paralympic Games all happened. Those events have a little more clout (and budget) than most, but they are a good sign we seem to be getting back to normal (or our new normal), and sponsors can start to engage with their properties and events again.

Volleyball Canada will have a busy 2022 hosting our key 'sponsor-valued' events like Youth Nationals in Edmonton, Volleyball Nations League in Ottawa and Calgary, and 2022 Beach Nationals in Toronto and Vancouver. That is important given entering 2021-2022, Volleyball Canada received the disappointing news that three major sponsors, Mizuno, Iululemon, and InterPipeline, were not renewing their partnerships.

One key partner category being focused on currently is the indoor footwear and apparel position vacated by long-term sponsor Mizuno. They did not agree to discuss new terms of a partnership given two years of virtually no business in volleyball and disappointment in our National Team using other footwear/kneepad brands during the Olympics in Tokyo. Volleyball Canada is in discussions with another brand and hopes to finalize a new partnership.

We have finalized agreements with two new sponsors; a new apparel partner (Left on Friday) for our women's beach volleyball program that will see them outfit our women's teams and staff through the 2024 Paris Olympics and two-year partnership with a volleyball-related 'yard-game' net system company (Crossnet). We hope to announce these partnerships in the coming weeks.

Our partnership with Volleyball Stuff continues to evolve regarding the co-development and sales of VC branded and Nationals event merchandise offerings -- new terms extend through 2026.

Mikasa Canada is the Official Beach Volleyball of Volleyball Canada and Official Volleyball of Volleyball Canada through 2026.

Given our partnerships typically follow the four-year 'Olympic Cycle,' and we have a few key categories vacant -- 2022 is a crucial year for renewals. We are in positive talks or at the formal contract stage with a number of those missing category partners that will put us in better shape heading towards 2024.

Having patience with doing the right deals with the right partners has been a key focus over the past year. Most companies have been through a few of the toughest financial years ever, and that, coupled with supply chain issues and non-existent sporting events, has made sponsorship an area easy to pull back on let alone build on - therefore now is a better time for us to be negotiating long term deals.

Volleyball Canada's sponsors include

Volleyball Stuff (VC and Event Merchandise 2026), Mikasa (Official Ball 2026), PUSH (Training 2026), Nothers (Awards 2024), Crossnet (Yard Game 2024), Left on Friday (Beach apparel 2024) and Speith America (Indoor Net Systems).



Communications Report

Media and Communications

Planning for national and international events dominated the new year after two years of cancellations and delays due to the pandemic. This is very positive for the sport and teams, with the challenge being capacity in staffing and resources to cover a wide range of events from a communications standpoint as well as assisting with marketing efforts.

Overall, the goal is to increase the exposure of volleyball in Canada, with a focus on accessibility of web casts for events, and continuing a strong partnership with CBC for increased viewership of events. Also audience engagement through partnerships, social media and the VC app will be a priority.

On the staff side, Josh Bell began full-time as communications coordinator in early 2022, focusing on Nationals and assisting with other events, with Courtney Killion taking over the portfolio of partnerships as well as coordinating digital content.

Social media

In addition to direct email and the web site, social media channels continue to be a big part of external communications and fan engagement.

With the return of events, it's also a key tool for partner engagement as well as marketing of international events.

The goal is to balance the fun side of social media while also using the platforms to share information about programs and subjects that enhance the quality and growth of the sport (ie. diversity, education, safe sport).

For events such as VNL, paid social media advertising is part of the marketing plans. This increases the reach beyond our audience or "followers".

Popular posts tend towards images and videos that focus on team or athlete milestones such as big wins or, as pictured below, retirements of key athletes.

VC has secured a media monitoring service, Meltwater, to track brand engagement and trend data, as well as monitoring social media mentions.




Application

Notes to Financial Statements

Year ended March 31, 2022

The mission of the Canadian Volleyball Association (the "Association") is to promote and develop the sport of volleyball for all Canadians. The Association was incorporated under the Canada Corporations Act as a not-for-profit organization as is a Registered Amateur Athletic Association under the Income Tax Act (Canada). Effective August 1, 2013, the Association continued its articles of incorporation from the Canada Corporations Act to the new Canada Not-for-profit Corporations Act.

1. Significant accounting policies:

The financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

(a) Basis of presentation:

The Association follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions for not-for-profit organizations.

(b) Revenue recognition:

Restricted revenue is recognized in the year in which the related expense is incurred. Unrestricted revenue is recognized when it is received or becomes receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

(c) Inventory:

Inventory consists mostly of referee uniforms and other paraphernalia. Inventory is measured at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Costs are assigned on a first-in, first-out basis.

(d) Donated supplies and services:

Companies and individuals donate supplies and services throughout the year to assist the Association in carrying out its activities. The value of these supplies and services is not readily determinable, therefore, no amount has been reflected in these financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

Year ended March 31, 2022

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(e) Financial instruments:

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value on initial recognition. Equity instruments that are quoted in an active market are subsequently measured at fair value. All other financial instruments are subsequently recorded at cost or amortized cost, unless management has elected to carry the instruments at fair value. The Association has elected to carry any such financial instruments at fair value.

Transaction costs incurred on the acquisition of financial instruments measured subsequently at fair value are expensed as incurred. All other financial instruments are adjusted by transaction costs incurred on acquisition and financing costs, which are amortized using the straight-line method.

Financial assets are assessed for impairment on an annual basis at the end of the fiscal year if there are indicators of impairment. If there is an indicator of impairment, the Association determines if there is a significant adverse change in the expected amount or timing of future cash flows from the financial asset. If there is a significant adverse change in the expected cash flows, the carrying value of the financial asset is reduced to the highest of the present value of the expected cash flows, the amount that could be realized from selling the financial asset or the amount the Association expects to realize by exercising its right to any collateral. If events and circumstances reverse in a future period, an impairment loss will be reversed to the extent of the improvement, not exceeding the initial carrying value.

(f) Restricted investments:

Restricted investments held in Funds with the Canadian Olympic Foundation (see note 9) are recorded at cost, being the Association's original contributions to the Funds. Investment income earned on these funds is not recognized by the Association until officially distributed to the Association by the Foundation.

(g) Tangible capital assets:

Tangible capital assets are stated at cost. Betterments which extend the estimated life of an asset are capitalized. When a tangible capital asset no longer contributes to the Association's ability to provide services, its carrying amount is written down to its residual value. Amortization is provided using the following methods and annual rates:

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(h) Expenses:

In the statement of operations, the Association presents its expenses by function. The Association does not allocate expenses between functions subsequent to initial recognition.

(i) Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from these estimates. These estimates are reviewed annually and as adjustments become necessary, they are recognized in the financial statements in the period in which they become known.

Cost and accumulated amortization at March 31, 2021 amounted to \$202,423 and \$181,819, respectively. During the year, the Association wrote off computer equipment with a cost of \$118,338 and accumulated amortization of \$109,727 resulting in a loss of \$7,693 that has been expensed in the year.

4. Accounts payable and accrued liabilities:

As at March 31, 2022 and 2021, there were no government remittances included in accounts payable and accrued liabilities, such as payroll remittances or harmonized sales tax.

Net assets:

The Association considers its capital to consist of its unrestricted and invested in tangible capital assets net assets. The objective of the Association with respect to its capital is to fund ongoing operations and future projects. The Association manages its capital by maintaining and monitoring amounts available for future projects, contingencies and other capital requirements.

The Association is not subject to externally imposed capital requirements and its overall strategy with respect to capital remains unchanged from the year ended March 31, 2021.

7. Contingencies:

Contributions received from Sport Canada are subject to specific terms and conditions regarding the expenditure of the funds. The Association's accounting records are subject to audit by Sport Canada. Should any instances be identified where amounts charged to projects are not in accordance with the agreed terms and conditions these amounts would be refundable to Sport Canada.

For the current year Management believes that the Association has not incurred ineligible expenditures and therefore no liability has been recorded for reimbursement.

8. Financial risks and concentration of credit risk:

(a) Liquidity risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Association will be unable to fulfill its obligations on a timely basis or at a reasonable cost. The Association manages its liquidity risk by monitoring its operating requirements. The Association prepares budget and cash forecasts to ensure it has sufficient funds to fulfill its obligations.

(b) Credit risk:

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty may default on its contractual obligations resulting in a financial loss. The Association is exposed to credit risk with respect to the accounts receivable. The Association assesses, on a continuous basis, accounts receivable and provides for any amounts that are not collectible in the allowance for doubtful accounts. At year-end, \$28,232 was allowed for in accounts receivable.

(c) Foreign currency risk:

Foreign currency risk refers to the extent to which instruments denominated in a currency other than Canadian dollars will be affected by changes in the value of the Canadian dollar in relation to other currencies. The Association is not subject to significant currency risk from its holdings of US cash.

The Association is not exposed to other price or interest rate risks.

9. Funds held with the Canadian Olympic Foundation:

The Association has established the following four Funds under agreement with the Canadian Olympic Foundation (the "Foundation") as approved by the Association's Board of Directors.

- (a) Description of the Funds:
 - (i) Volleyball Canada General Fund ("VC Fund"): The purpose of this Fund is to provide general support to Volleyball Canada.
 - (ii) The Hoag Team Canada Fund ("Hoag Fund"): Founded by Glenn Hoag and his family, the purpose of this Fund is to enhance Team Canada men's volleyball pillars of growth, success and excellence by providing support for high-quality training and competition conditions at the national team level.
 - (iii) The Wong Family Fund ("Wong Fund): Founded by Hugh Wong and his family, the purpose of this Fund it to provide support to promising Canadian female volleyball coaches who have potential to coach internationally and/or for the national team program.
 - (iv) The Tom Ng Beach Athlete Assistance Fund ("Ng Fund"): Founded by Tom Ng, the purpose of this Fund is to offset the training and competition expenses of a Canadian high performance beach volleyball athlete.

Under the terms of the agreements, the Funds are administered by the Foundation in accordance with their Endowment Policy and Granting Policy. For investment purposes, the assets of the Funds may be pooled with other amounts held by the Foundation and are not held as separate trust funds. The Foundation provides the Association with an annual accounting report of each Fund on a calendar year basis.

The Association may make contributions to the Fund and is able to request the withdrawal of all or part of their contributions from the Funds at any time. These contributions are recorded in restricted investments and internally restricted net assets.

Other individuals and organizations may also make contributions directly to the Funds. The Association does not have the ability to withdraw these contributions from the Fund. Accumulated investment income is also maintained in the Fund until officially distributed by the Foundation. These amounts are not recorded in these financial statements.
